Enrollment Policies
A.R.S. § 15-184 (A, B, E)

Skyline Academy does not limit admission based on ethnicity, national origin, gender, income level, disabling condition, proficiency in English language, or athletic ability.

Skyline Academy has a fair and equitable policy to enroll all eligible students, who submit a timely application, unless the number of applicants exceeds the capacity of the school facility. INFORMATION

What is the Academic Honors Program?

A program designed to challenge Skyline Private Academy students to go above and beyond in their education fostering exposure to advanced academics including, but not limited to, increased rigor, independent study, project-based learning, capstone projects, and participation in the yearly Academic Honors Fair.

Who is eligible to apply to the Academic Honors Program?

Any enrolled AZ Compass Prep School, Skyline Gila River, Skyline Prep High School or Skyline Private Academy student, grades 9 – 12, may submit an application for review. Students and parent(s)/guardian(s) are encouraged to not only look at past performance as an indicator of success in the program (there is not a GPA requirement) but to consider the following: A student's desire and willingness to put forth their very best effort to grow not only in academics but also in character; a student's willingness to accept and incorporate guidance and feedback from school administration and faculty to aid them in academic and personal growth; a student's willingness and ability to commit to the extra time required for homework, independent study, project completion, and meeting outside of regular class hours with their instructor(s); a parent(s)/guardian(s) willingness and ability to support their student in their efforts to succeed in the program.

When may I apply to the Academic Honors Program?

Academic Honors Program enrollment is perpetual. Applications are accepted on a continuous basis, according to the application deadline table, for entrance into the program in Blocks 1, 2, 3, or 4 of any academic level year (9, 10, 11, or 12).

How will I receive Academic Honor's Program Instruction?

Academic Honors Program instruction will start within the standard course classroom; honors course and standard course students will be in the classroom together. Academic Honors Program students will work off an enhanced syllabus that will include not only standard classroom instruction but also advanced and independent reading/research/study, additional or advanced homework assignments, potential Capstone Projects and/or Academic Honors Fair presentations, and meetings with instructors outside of regular classroom hours.

How are the Academic Honors Program courses graded?

Our program utilizes a 5.0 weighted Grade Point Average (GPA) scale as our measure of accomplishment. Weighted GPA scales give colleges a better initial sense of the academic potential of students based on the rigor of their coursework; they also lead to greater accuracy in class rankings.

An “A” (5.0) on our weighted scale is worth an extra 1.0 point compared to an “A” (4.0) on a standard scale. Likewise, a “B” (4.0) on our weighted scale is the equivalent of an “A” (4.0) on a standard grading scale.

Not only are colleges able to identify students who have challenged themselves in high rigor courses by title, they are also able to easily identify success in those courses as well as college readiness by higher GPAs.

Academic recognitions (Valedictorian, Salutatorian, Skyline Scholars, NHS, and NCAA) all rely on GPA as the primary qualifier. Our weighted GPA scale results in higher GPAs for excelling students in addition to a more accurate ranking system where students who take standard courses are not likely to surpass students who take Academic Honors Program courses. This is also serves as incentive for students to challenge themselves in honors courses as it won’t harm their GPA unless they end up earning significantly poorer grades.

What are the expectations of Academic Honors Students?

Academic Honors Program students are highly encouraged to undertake, individually and collectively, responsibility for their own academic and personal growth while fostering growth in other students through leadership by example, active contribution to a positive classroom environment, consistent completion of assignments with effort and integrity, and respect for and adherence to school/classroom policies and procedures. At minimum, Academic Honors Program students must maintain a 3.0 GPA in all their courses (honor/standard, core/elective) and a 93% attendance rate to remain in the program. Students falling short of expectations will be placed on a Performance Plan for improvement should they desire to remain in the Academic Honors Program.

How will I know if I’m accepted into the Academic Honors Program? Applicants will be scheduled to meet with their Academic Dean to discuss either their acceptance into the Program/selection of Honors Courses or their Performance Plan for future acceptance. Performance Plans will outline specific areas of concern that should be improved upon in order for students to be accepted into and experience success in the Academic Honors Program.

Payment Information

Application Fee: The application fee covers the cost of the application, document preparation, and mailing of acceptance documents. The fee is non-refundable. We accept school enrollments on an ongoing basis. Housing is based on availability, acceptance to school does not guarantee housing availability. The deadline to apply for housing August admission (fall semester) is June 1. The deadline to apply for January admission (spring semester) is December 1.

Food and Meals @ Home: This fee covers two meals per day during the week at home to ensure students are receiving adequate daily nutrition for breakfast and dinner. Students are responsible for lunch at school.

Placement Services and Management: This fee includes the placement of student in a safe living environment with thorough vetting and continuous monitoring over living conditions. This also includes exposure to American culture, food, music, visits to local and regional landmarks, universities and creating a family bond for life.

**Additional Fees:* Yearbook, certain Field Trip Costs, sport fees specific to each sport. Please see enrollment packet. Additional fees may cover all athletic clinics (one on one and team clinics), all annual competitive games in season, tournaments, travel, Player Development and Leadership Development which includes education regarding NCAA, NAIA, college application submission, community involvement, university visits, video coverage of performance and assistance with potential placement in post-secondary schools and Universities.

Payment Schedule:

New Students: A non-refundable enrollment fee of \$150 per student is due with the enrollment application.

FERPA NOTIFICATION

Annual Notification to Parents Regarding Confidentiality of Student Education Records

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

- Parents or eligible students have the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the school within 45 days of a request made to the school administrator. Schools are not required to provide copies of records unless it is impossible for parents or eligible students to review the records without copies. Schools may charge a fee for copies.
- Parents or eligible students have the right to request in writing that a school correct records that they believe to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student then has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record setting forth his or her view about the contested information.
- Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student in order to release any information from a student's education record. However, FERPA allows schools to disclose those records, without consent, to the following parties or under the following conditions:
 - School officials with legitimate educational interest
 - A school official is a person employed or contracted by the school to serve as an administrator, supervisor, teacher, or support staff member (including health staff, law enforcement personnel, attorney, auditor, or other similar roles); a person serving on the school board; or a parent or student serving on an official committee or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks;
 - A legitimate educational interest means the review of records is necessary to fulfill a professional responsibility for the school;
 - o Other schools to which a student is seeking to enroll;
 - o Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes;
 - o Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
 - o Organizations conducting certain studies for or on behalf of the school;
 - o Accrediting organizations;
 - o To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena;
 - o Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies; and
 - o State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific State law.

Schools may disclose, without consent, "directory" information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, email, date and place of birth, honors and awards, sports participation (including height and weight of athletes) and dates of attendance unless notified by the parents or eligible student by [INSERT DATE] that the school is not to disclose the information without consent.

Skyline Education, Inc. School Bus Guidelines and Rules

The conduct of students aboard a school bus must be controlled in order to provide safe and efficient transportation. The students aboard a bus are under the authority of the bus driver and directly responsible to the driver. The attached articles are provided for driver guidance in maintaining student discipline. In the enforcement of student discipline, the drivers should work closely with school administrators. In the event of unresolved problems aboard the bus, after consulting with the school administrator, drivers should bring the matter to the attention of the Director of Transportation.

1. **DRIVER'S AUTHORITY:** Students in a school bus are the complete responsibility of the bus driver and under his/her direction; students must always be courteous and show respect for the driver and obey the driver's instructions.
2. **BUS STOP ASSIGNMENT:** Students may not get on or off the bus at any location other than their regularly scheduled stop. Parents must submit in writing a bus change 24 hours in advance. When an emergency occurs, a parent may arrange for an alternative authorized bus stop on a limited basis.
3. **BUS DEPARTURE TIMES:** Students should be at their bus stop at least 10 minutes prior to the scheduled pick up time; buses must operate on a definite schedule and drivers will not wait for late arrivals. Students are not to arrive at the stop more than 10 minutes prior to the departure time. Excessive late arrivals to the bus stop will result in disciplinary action.
4. **BOARDING THE BUS:** As the bus approaches, students must form an orderly single-file line and stand no closer than 10 feet. Students shall not move towards the bus until it has come to a complete stop. Students must enter the bus one at a time, with no pushing or shoving in line.
5. **SEAT ASSIGNMENT:** Students are to take the seat indicated by the driver; they may not exchange seats without the driver's permission.
6. **STUDENTS MUST REMAIN SEATED:** Students must sit upright, face the front of the bus, keep feet out of the aisle, and in no way obstruct aisles or bar progress of other students moving in or out of the bus. Standing, walking, or any movement out of seats while the bus is in motion is prohibited.
7. **BUS WINDOWS:** Windows may not be lowered without the driver's permission and at no time may they be lowered below the second notch (the window should never be open more than 6 inches).
8. ***HANDS/BODY OUT OF WINDOWS:** Students may not extend hands, arms, head or any other part of the body out of the window at any time on the school bus. Unauthorized exiting from emergency doors and windows is prohibited.
9. ***TAMPERING WITH BUS EQUIPMENT:** Tampering of any kind with bus doors, emergency exits, radio, or controls is prohibited.
10. ***SMOKING NOT ALLOWED:** Smoking, use of any tobacco product, lighters, or lighting of any material is prohibited and is against the law.
11. **EXCESSIVE NOISE/DISORDERLY CONDUCT:** Students are prohibited from creating disturbances such as whistling, playing musical instruments, yelling or talking loudly, throwing articles, shooting rubber bands, scuffling, etc. Students shall quietly converse only with those students sitting in the same seat they occupy. Distractions and noise levels inside the bus must be kept to a minimum so the driver can hear and observe approaching emergency vehicles, horns, or other impending hazards.
12. ***PROFANE LANGUAGE/GESTURES:** Using profane language or obscene gestures is prohibited.
13. **LITTERING:** Littering or throwing of objects of any kind is prohibited.
14. ***FIGHTING:** Students may not interfere with others, nor destroy the property of others; they may not intimidate or threaten anyone on the bus. Students must keep their hands to themselves; fighting, slapping, hitting, poking, shoving, pulling hair, etc., in the bus or at the stop, is prohibited.
15. **EATING/DRINKING:** Drinking, items other than water, or eating, including gum and candy, is prohibited at any time.

- 16. **PROHIBITED OBJECTS:** Items such as glass containers and large or dangerous objects are not allowed on the bus. Transporting live animals, fish, reptiles, or insects on the bus is prohibited.
- 17. ***DAMAGE TO THE SCHOOL BUS OR BUS STOP:** Students may not vandalize or damage the school bus or bus stop. Parent(s)/Guardian(s) will be required to pay for damage done by their child to either the school bus or to private property at the bus stop location.

WHEN ENFORCEMENT OF DISCIPLINE IS REQUIRED THE FOLLOWING DISCIPLINE FLOW CHART IS USED:

The school bus driver will issue:

- At least 2 verbal warnings, then
- One written warning, then
- If the student’s behavior does not improve, the driver will make a recommendation of denial of bus privileges to the school administrator
 - on occasion, a school administrator may request the driver to request a parent conference or a bus driver may request to attend. In either case, arrangements to attend and participate should be coordinated through the Director of Transportation. School administrators will be responsible for informing the Director of times and dates.

The situations listed below, and asterisked under the Bus Guidelines and Rules, are serious offenses and are regarded as Disorderly Conduct. The Discipline Flow Chart will not be followed; an immediate recommendation to deny transportation will be given:

- Unauthorized jumping out or entering the bus through windows and emergency exits
- Tampering with bus equipment e.g. emergency door, brakes, switches or other devices used in the operation of a school bus
- Smoking in the school bus
- Lighting lighters, matches or other materials; exploding firecrackers or burning papers on the bus
- Degrading, vulgar or profane speech or gestures directed at the driver or other students on the bus
- Use of physical force upon the driver or inflicting injury upon other students through the use of physical force
- Intentional destruction or defacing of seats or paneling within the bus
- Refusal to remain seated while the bus is in motion after verbal warnings.

Charter Schools are not reimbursed for transportation, therefore Skyline Education, Inc. transportation is a courtesy to our students. We must follow pre-determined routes. The \$25.00 fee is a reservation fee, non-refundable, (first come first serve) so we do not overpopulate the bus. Due to this you may not get a seat on the bus to school and it is not the school’s responsibility to transport your student to and from school. Charter Schools are schools of choice and the ADE does not reimburse the school for transporting any student.
